ANT 103 29479 Introduction to Archaeology Michaud-Stutzman
Wednesday 4-6:30P USM Video Conferencing

This course describes the methods and theories used by modern archaeologists to uncover information about past human life ways. Attention is given to techniques of survey and excavation of archaeological materials; concepts of space and time in archaeology; and detailed analysis of artifacts and organic residues. Some attention will be given to specific topics such as the archaeology of Maine. Credits: 3

ARH 206 29561 History of Photography II (1930 to Present) Stoddard
Wednesday 7-9:45P UMA Video Conferencing

A comprehensive survey of photography, its technical innovations, social impact and the work of photography's major artists. The course deals with contemporary photographers from 1930 to present including the works of such masters as Weston, Adams, Frank, and White. Credits: 3

BIO 110 29735/ 29736 Introduction to Biology Robbins
Monday 4-6:45P/ 7-9P (Lab) UMA On Site

Examines the underlying unity of all living things at the molecular and cellular level. Topics include the chemical composition of living matter, cellular organization, metabolism, classic and molecular genetics and evolution. Prerequisite: recent chemistry course highly recommended. Credits: 4

BIO 150 30467 Ecology Cichocki
Wednesday 1-3:45P UMA Video Conferencing

Considers the principles and processes of natural ecosystems from a biological perspective including the relationships of organisms to each other and their environment. Selected aspects of human ecology will be considered but are not the major emphasis.

BIO 210 29740/ 29741 Anatomy and Physiology Robbins
Tuesday 4-6:45P/ 7-9P (Lab) UMA On Site

A study of the structural & functional relationships of the human body systems including concepts of the regulatory process that integrate body cells, tissues & organs. This course assumes a basic understanding of cellular physiology. Prerequisite: BIO 110 or recent biology course. Credits: 4

BUA 211 30938 Accounting for Management Decisions Boone
Monday 1-3:45P UMA Video Conferencing

This course focuses on financial decision making at a management level. Topics covered include relevancy of information, internal financial statement analysis, inventory management, performance measurement, cost analysis, budgeting, and management decision making. Prerequisite: BUA101 Principles of Accounting I or permission of instructor. This course may be used as a substitute for BUA102 Principles of Accounting. II. Credit 3.

BUA 216 30929 Consumer Lending Leach
Tuesday 7-9:45P UMA Video Conferencing

This course provides a thorough presentation of the consumer credit function. Topics include the consumer installment credit market, regulation of consumer credit, the lending process, loan pricing, collections, and management of the consumer credit function. The purpose is to provide the student with a thorough understanding of the consumer credit function and its significance within the scope of the banking organization.

BUA 365 **29586** **Organizational Behavior** **Bowne**
Tuesday 7-9:45P UMA Video Conferencing

(This course is cross listed with POS 365.) An analysis of the interaction between individual and work group behavior leadership styles and organizational cultures. Applications of behavioral sciences are made in areas of motivation and influence, structure of work, leader group relations and organizational design and change. Emphasis is on application of theory in case studies and simulations. Prerequisite: BUA 223

CIS 100 **29870** **Introduction to Computing** **Sanford**
Tuesday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

This course presents computing concepts and technology, and introduces students to productivity applications used in the work place, such as E-mail, the Internet, word-processing, spreadsheets, database management systems, and presentation graphics. Students acquire skills by means of intensive, hands-on work in a computer laboratory. Credits: 3

CIS 470 **24282** **Project Management** **Roper**
Thursday 4-6:45P UMA Video Conferencing

This course deals with the factors necessary for successful management of and planning for information systems development including integration of systems development with organizational goals, planning, and budgeting; and the use of metrics, tools, and Total Quality Management (TQM) concepts. Both technical and behavioral aspects of management are considered. Prerequisites: CIS 330, BUA 101 AND BUA 223 or permission of the instructor

COM 102 **29753** **Interpersonal Communications** **Merckens**
Thursday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

Concerned with verbal and nonverbal communication that takes place among individuals during interpersonal interaction. Typical areas of concern are perceiving others, presenting one's self, conversation and barriers to communication. Activities may include games, exercises and role playing. Credits: 3

DRA 389 **30492** **Topics in Film and Theatre: Hitchcock** **Phippen**
Monday 1-3:45P UMA Video Conferencing

Alfred Hitchcock is called the "Shakespeare of the Cinema", and for good reason, because of the richness of his many film masterpieces. In this course, we will explore twelve of his famous films from the beginning to the end of his career, along with a couple of his best TV shows. Some films include: Shadow of a doubt, Saboteur, Rear Window, Psycho, The Birds and Vertigo. Students will be asked to respond to the films in critical essays. Prerequisites: Eng 101, Dra 280 or 265, or permission of instructor. Credits: 3

EDU 351 **31376** **Teaching Elementary Reading** **Murakami**
Thursday 7-9:45P UMPI Video Conferencing

Designed to develop an in-depth knowledge of the current theory and practices involved in teaching reading in the elementary school. This class identifies instructional strategies for reading and the language arts, and examines classroom organizational and management techniques. Prerequisite: EDU 200 Credits: 3

ECH 384 **29285** **Science Education for Young Children** **Beach**
Friday 5-8:15P UMF On Site
Saturday 8:30A-3P UMF On Site

Meets January 29/30, February 26/27, March 19/20, April 9/10 and April 30/May 1

Focuses on constructivist models of teaching and learning and science content knowledge for young children ages birth to eight years. Emphasis of the course will be on teaching and assessment techniques, strategies and activities that may be used to teach a diverse community of learners in the early childhood science classroom. This course will include opportunities for application. Prerequisite(s): Professional Standing in Education; one laboratory science course or permission of the instructor. Every year. Credits: 4

ENG 005 29269 Basic Writing Ritchie
Monday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

A workshop approach designed to help students develop the basic skills they need for writing coherent expository prose. Students will learn how to edit their own papers as they are led systematically through all stages of composition--prewriting, writing, rewriting. This course is prerequisite to ENG 101 College Writing, but may be waived by any student who achieves sufficiently high scores on the UMA Placement Test or the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT). The course carries three credits, but they do not satisfy any degree requirements. Credits: 3

ENG 101 29270 College Writing Hendrickson
Monday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

Intensive practice in expository writing with reading of illustrative materials. Required of all students. Prerequisite: ENGA 005 Basic Writing with a grade of "C" or better, REAA 008 Reading for Understanding with a grade of "C" or better, or passing grade on diagnostic tests. Credits: 3

ENG 101 29599 College Writing Ritchie
Monday 10A-12:45P UMA Video Conferencing

Intensive practice in expository writing with reading of illustrative materials. Required of all students. Prerequisite: ENG005 with a grade of C or better or passing grade on diagnostic tests and REA008 with a grade of C or better or passing grade on diagnostic tests.

ENG 102W 29271 Introduction to Literature Leo
Monday 10A-12:45P UMA On Site

A general introduction to literary genres--the essay, short story, novel, drama, & poetry--including a study of critical terminology, close textual reading, & practice in writing. Six papers, at least one dealing with each genre, will be required. Prerequisite: ENG 101 College Writing. Credits: 3

ENG 317W 29274 Professional Writing Leo
Tuesday 10A-12:45P UMA On Site

An advanced course in professional document design that applies problem-solving strategies to resolve communication issues. Practice in editing and collaborative writing is included. Students are expected to use communications software to produce and revise their documents. They may be required to research subjects via the Internet and use e-mail to communicate with each other and the professor. One-third of the semester is devoted to an individual project. Prerequisite: ENGA 101 College Writing or permission. Credits: 3.

HCE 612 23579 Multicultural Counseling: Family Disability Tully
Thursday 4-6:45P USM Video Conferencing

This course provides an in-depth analysis of the effects of developmental, mental, and physical disability on individuals and their families within the context of a pluralistic society. It will explore the experience of living with a disability and family dynamics in the context of the broader community and society. Students will study multicultural issues relative to disability, counseling, and rehabilitation. The course also examines the reactions, adjustments, and accommodations to disability as perceived by individuals with disabilities, their families, and rehabilitation counseling professionals. Credits: 4

HCE 614 **31703** **Principles of Psychosocial Rehabilitation** **Murphy**
Wednesday 4-6:45P USM Video Conferencing

This course provides a foundation of knowledge and skills useful in habilitation and rehabilitation work with persons who have psychiatric disabilities. A major emphasis of this course addresses skill development and attitudinal changes needed by the helper/counselor/caseworker in implementing a compensatory model vs. a medical model of treatment for persons with psychiatric disabilities. Text material, research articles, guest presentations, videos, community site visits, and "real play" through extensive dyad/small group student interaction are used to promote learning. This course is required for master's degree candidates in psychosocial rehabilitation. It is also open to persons interested in this innovative approach to mental illness. Credits: 3

HCE 690 **22797** **Individual Counseling: Practicum Seminar** **Murphy**
Thursday 7-9:45P USM Video Conferencing

Through lecture, discussion, and group supervision students learn to apply professional knowledge and skills to the practice of counseling with individuals. Role playing, video and audio tapes, and demonstrations are used in helping students develop an integrated counseling style. This course is taken concurrently with HCE 691. Prerequisites: HCE 620, HCE 621, HCE 622 (school counseling specialty only), and HCE 626. Credits: 3

HON 300W **30496** **Critical Thinking & Writing** **Schlenker**
Wednesday 10A-12:45P UMA Video Conferencing

An introduction to the principles and standards for thinking and communicating clearly and effectively. Intended to improve the student's ability to analyze, interpret, and evaluate issues, ideas, and problems. Prerequisite: ENG 101 or CLEP waiver, or permission of Director of Honors Program.

HTY 123I **19577** **U.S. History Since 1900** **Kaufman**
Wednesday 4-6:30P UMA On Site

A continuation of the treatment of the American people and nation extends coverage of political, social, economic, intellectual, institutional, and diplomatic development through the twentieth century. The events, issues, and peoples of the modern nations and their relations to the larger world are covered within the country's increasing international involvement. Credits: 3.

HTY 457 **30930** **Civil War & Reconstruction** **Wigderson**
Tuesday 1-3:45P UMA Video Conferencing

This course will study the Civil War and Reconstruction era in U.S. history (1847-1877). It will consist of a brief survey of the entire period as well as in-depth studies of selected topics. These topics may include battles and leaders, gender and the War, post emancipation race relations and the social construction of class. Prerequisite: ENG101 and HTY103 or permission of instructor.

HUM 289 **30931** **Topics: Introduction to American Studies** **Hentges**
Tuesday 4-6:45P UMA Video Conferencing

Students will examine a variety of works in literature, history, cultural criticism, social and political theory, music, the visual arts, and other fields with an eye toward comprehending how Americans of different backgrounds have understood and argued about the meaning and significance of U.S. national identity. The course invites students to consider new ways of interpreting a multifaceted culture through a global lens and to investigate competing perspectives regarding experiences in and about "America." Prerequisite: Eng 102 or Permission of Instructor. Credits: 3

HUM 330 **29275** **Science, Technology and Ethics** **Baker**
Thursday 1-3:45P UMA On Site

This course will increase scientific, technological, and ethical literacy by examining contemporary social, moral, and political issues in science, technology, and society. Issues in the following areas that impact our lives will be analyzed: natural resources and energy; medical technologies; weapons development; communications technologies. Prerequisites: ENG 101 and PHI 103, or any ethics course, or permission of the instructor. Credits: 3.

HUM 389 **29603** **Topics: Buffy, the Vampire Slayer** **Lisi**
Wednesday 10A-12:45P UMA Video Conferencing

This class applies theory and analysis to Joss Whedon's modern cult television classic Buffy the Vampire Slayer. Pairing canonical philosophers like Plato, Aristotle, Kant, Nietzsche with particular episodes of the show, we'll juggle various perspectives to critique popular culture's most analyzed opus. Our hybrid online class will meet face to face every other week for guided viewings of the show and also sustain online dialogue on the readings, episodes, and our writing. Prerequisite: ENG 102 or permission of instructor. Credits: 3

HUS 101 **29754** **Introduction to Social Service System** **Line**
Friday 10A-12:45P UMA On Site

An introduction to social welfare systems and their functions as they relate to social needs and problems within the political, social and economic contexts. An overview of the history and development of social welfare systems, the range of current social services and the knowledge and skills necessary for responding to human needs. Credits: 3.

JUS 103 **27156** **Foundation of Criminal Justice** **Mears**
Wednesday 1-3:45P UMA Video Conferencing

This course will analyze the developmental events that have shaped the processes which constitute the major contemporary criminal justice institutions. The historical development of law, police, courts, corrections, and juvenile justice systems are studied from their early beginnings to contemporary issues, which may lead to future trends in justice.

MAT 009 **29871** **Foundations of Mathematics** **Hedgcock**
Tuesday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

The course emphasizes arithmetic computations and informal geometry. Some of the topics included are elementary number theory, operations with fractions, decimals, ratios, proportions, percents, signed numbers, data interpretation, an introduction and preparation for algebra. Credits for this course do not fulfill degree requirements. Minimum grade of "C" to go on to the next course. Credits: 3

MAT 030 **29872** **Algebra I** **Hedgcock**
Tuesday 10A-12:45P UMA On Site

Topics include a review of fundamentals, real numbers, algebraic expressions, first degree equations in one variable, polynomials, factoring, rational expressions, graphing, square roots, quadratic equations, and exponents. Problem solving and informal geometry will be integrated throughout the course. Prerequisite: a grade of "C" or better in MAT009, MAT020, or an appropriate score on the UMA placement test. Credits for this course do not fulfill degree requirements. Credits: 3

MAT 111 **29873** **Algebra II** **Hedgcock**
Wednesday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

This course includes advanced work in the topics of MAT030. Additional topics include functional notation, systems of equations in two or more variables, matrices and determinants and radical equations. Prerequisite: appropriate Placement Test score. Credits: 3.

MUS 123 **29279** **Understanding Music** **Gillespie**

Wednesday 9-11:45A UMA On Site

A study of the basic elements of music necessary for intelligent listening, with emphasis on various historical movements, together with a study of the great composers and their contrasting styles as exemplified by their most important compositions. For non-music majors. This class requires a live classical concert attendance. Credits: 3

NUR 102 24290 Nursing Care Adult Client I Staff
Monday/Thursday 10A-12:30P UMA Video Conferencing

This course introduces the student to the nursing care of patients experiencing common recurring illnesses with expected outcomes. The focus of this course is the impact of the stressors of illness on basic human needs. The use of the nursing process is developed as the approach for assessing and diagnosing patients physiological and psychosocial needs and planning appropriate nursing interventions. The course includes the use of the college laboratory and clinical experiences in the hospital setting. Lec 4, Lab 12. Prerequisite: NUR 101, BIO 110, PSY 100, ENG 101. Note: MAT 100 and BIO 210 must be completed prior to or taken concurrently with NUR102.

PHI 250 29281 Ethics Baker
Thursday 9-11:45A UMA On Site

A critical study of metaethics, ethical theories, and contemporary moral issues. Emphasizing the application of ethics to real-life situations, the course covers topics such as ethical relativism, subjectivism, morality and religion, utilitarianism, Kant, theories of punishment, abortion, capital punishment, euthanasia, censorship, sexual morality, affirmative action, and animal rights. Prerequisite: ENG101. Credits: 3

POS 365 30662 Organizational Behavior Bowne
Tuesday 7-9:45P UMA Video Conferencing

(This course is cross listed with BUA 365.) An analysis of the interaction between individual and work-group behavior leadership styles and organizational cultures. Applications of behavioral sciences are made in areas of motivation and influence, structure of work, leadership, group relations, organizational design and change. Emphasis is on application of theory in case studies and simulations. Prerequisite: BUA/JUS/ POS 223

PSY 100 29755 Introduction to Psychology DeSisto
Wednesday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

This is a basic course in the psychology sequence. Topics covered in this course include background and methods, learning theories, brain and nervous system, personality, perception, intelligence, motivation, emotions, thinking and problem solving, human development, abnormal behavior and social interaction. Credits: 3

PSY 308 29756 Human Development Lemay
Tuesday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

Introduces the student to principles of human development. Human Development provides a lifespan approach focusing on the physical, mental, emotional, social, and spiritual characteristics of individuals. Emphasis will be placed on psychological stages and needs. Prerequisite: PSYA 100 Intro to Psychology. Credits: 3.

PSY 400 29758 Abnormal Psychology Mayo
Monday 4-6:45P UMA On Site

This course covers the history, scope and classification of mental illness and the effectiveness of treatment methods. Topics include schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, behavioral disorders, social deviance

and anxiety-related disorders. The biological and environmental determinants of abnormal behaviors are addressed. Prerequisite: PSYA 100 Intro to Psychology. CR 3.

SCI 210	29749 / 29750 (Lab)	Introduction to Marine Science	Naiden
Thursday	4-6:45P/ 7-9P	UMA On Site	

This course examines the processes that connect the physical, chemical, biological, and geological aspects of the oceans. Emphasis will be placed on the importance of the ocean and marine ecosystems to the health of the planet. Credits: 4.

SED 325	31251	Assessment/Special Education	Ball
Monday	4-6:45P	UMM Video Conferencing	

Students in this course will examine the principles and procedures of non-discriminatory evaluation under IDEA as it relates to K-12 students with mild to moderate disabilities. Emphasis will be placed on basic terminology; legal and ethical principles related to the assessment of students with special needs; technical adequacy of assessment instruments; identification of assessment instruments; administration of individualized norm-referenced assessments; and effective communication of evaluation results. Prerequisite: SED 310 or permission of instructor. Credits: 3

SSC 330	29276	Science, Technology and Ethics	Baker
Thursday	1-3:45P	UMA On Site	

This course will increase scientific, technological, and ethical literacy by examining contemporary social, moral, and political issues in science, technology, and society. Issues in the following areas that impact our lives will be analyzed: natural resources and energy; medical technologies; weapons development; communications technologies. Prerequisites: ENG 101 and PHI 103, or any ethics course, or permission of the instructor. Credits: 3

THE 170F	31012	Public Speaking	Slack
Tuesday	10A-12:30P	USM Video Conferencing	

An introductory course in the art of public discourse. Primarily a lecture-performance course, students will learn the basics of informative, persuasive, and argumentative speaking, as well as the processes of problem-solving and informative discussion. Credits: 3

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
